Best Kept Secret: FREE Mammograms, Breast Cancer Treatment in PA

f I could shout it from the rooftops, I would. Pennsylvania offers FREE mammograms and FREE Treatment for breast cancer for women who are uninsured or underinsured! After decades of meeting women across the state, I am always surprised to know how many have never heard of Pennsylvania's HealthyWoman Program and BCCPT (Breast and Cervical Cancer Prevention Treatment) program. covers all health care expenses while a woman is in treatment for breast cancer.

When I tell women about it, the first question usually is, "Do I qualify?" HealthyWoman and BCCPT are available for both women who do not have health insurance and for women who have limited insurance (high co-pays, deductibles) and cannot afford to pay for regular mammograms. For example, a woman with a family of four who has a gross annual household income of \$61,500 or less, qualifies for a free mammogram

through the HealthyWoman program. Breast cancer, when detected in its earliest stages, has a 98.6 percent 5-year survival rate according to the National Institutes of Health. That is why regular screening mammograms are so vital for women.

The PA Breast Cancer Coalition works to ensure that YOU have the best screening options available. Thanks to Governor Tom Wolf, PA is the *first state in the nation* to offer FREE 3D screening mammograms at no additional cost. 3D screenings are covered as part of the HealthyWoman program. Women who are insured by Medicare and Pennsylvania Medicaid are also covered.

Molly Lutton represents Franklin County in the PBCC traveling photo exhibit "67 Women, 67 Counties: Facing Breast Cancer in PA." The message on her panel of the exhibit reads:

Breast cancer is pervasive. It doesn't discriminate and is merciless. I lost my mother-in-law to inflammatory breast cancer in January of 2013. That same year my mother died after a 17-year battle with metastatic breast cancer in December. Just three months later I was diagnosed with breast cancer, 33 years old, 30 weeks pregnant with our fourth baby. Several surgeries, and chemotherapy with a newborn, and with much love and support I did it.

Tell us about learning you had breast cancer.

MOLLY: My mom had metastatic breast cancer and passed away in December 2013. A breast cancer remembrance day was scheduled for the following March in Chambersburg, and I planned to attend to honor her memory. By the time of the event, I had been diagnosed with breast cancer.

I was 33 years old and 30 weeks pregnant with our fourth child. I found the lump myself and mentioned it to my ob/gyn during a routine appointment. We thought it was probably from the hormones but as time went on and nothing changed, my doctor said she wasn't comfortable letting it go without having a breast surgeon take a look at it. We had done an ultrasound but that was inconclusive and we couldn't do a mammogram because of the baby. It all happened very fast. It was a Monday or Tuesday when I had the biopsy, I got a call on Wednesday saying it was cancerous, and I had a mastectomy on Friday.

How did you hear about the PBCC?

MOLLY: PBCC executive director Jen Pensinger and I went to elementary and middle school together and she ordered a PBCC Friends Like Me care package for me when I was first diagnosed.

At that Chambersburg remembrance event, I met Sharon Brosious (previous PBCC Shining Light Awardee) of the Cumberland Valley Breast Care Alliance. She wrapped all of us up in her and she has become a dear friend and a help to our entire family. She was supportive and rallied around us

and got all of us connected to the PBCC programs, and then I was invited to represent Franklin County in the photo exhibit.

What does the PBCC mean to you?

MOLLY: Breast cancer patients and our families would not have the advocacy for our health and our well-being without the amazing work the PBCC does. I don't think we would even have as much hope as we do because of the research the organization supports. It is awesome to know that someone is working on making things better for all of us and hopefully finding a cure.

What do you want other women to learn?

MOLLY: Like so many women, at first I was scared and I kept thinking that there's no way I could do this. You look at other survivors and think I don't know if I can do what they've done. I've learned how empowering it is to know that there are people rooting for you. I know that some women even shy away from having checkups and mammograms out of fear of finding something wrong. But it is so much better to face it, treat it, come up with a plan and get through it. I felt overwhelmed at first but now that I'm on the other side of it all I think is "Wow, I did that!" Always remember that you are stronger than you think you are.

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


duration and intensity of therapy as most patients multiple experience treatments over time.

There are a number of therapies now available that can help people live productive and quality lives for sometimes many years. However, as

a result there is a reset of "normal" and patients experience the ups and downs of disease and therapeutic management over a potentially long period of time. This constant cycling over time can be very distressing for patients and their loved ones.

Often in appointments, the focus

of both the patient and clinician is on the very tangible qualities: lab work, imaging studies, therapies, and side effects. "What are the tumor markers doing?" "What did the CT scan show?" "What are the options and what are the side effects?" The appointment becomes: "How is my/ your cancer today?" instead of "How are you today?" As a result, the




When the **focus** is placed upon the **person** and what is important to her, better
