PBCC Joins First Lady Michele Ridge to Present Research Grants

Pat Halpin-Murphy, President and Founder of the Pennsylvania Breast Cancer Coalition joined First Lady Michele Ridge, Honorary Chairwoman of the PBCC at Hershey Medical Center on March 1st to present the second year research grants from the Income Tax Check Off for Breast and Cervical Cancer Research. Grants were presented to six breast and cervical cancer researchers from The University of Pennsylvania, The University of Pittsburgh, Fox Chase Cancer Center and Penn State University College of Medicine. In 1997, Governor Tom Ridge signed the PBCC's income tax check check-off legislation allowing Pennsylvanians to donate their state tax refund to breast and cervical cancer research. In its first two years the program raised more than \$500,000. One hundred percent of the money is distributed as grants to researchers across the state. The research funds are administered through the Income Tax Check-Off committee of the PA Department of Health. PBCC President Pat Halpin-Murphy, co-chairs the committee that awards the grants.

The Income Tax Check-Off for Breast and Cervical Cancer Research continues to be the favorite among state taxpayers. This year more than 30,000 Pennsylvanians donated their state tax refunds to breast and cervical cancer research, with an average donation of \$8 per donor.

Research Studies Examine **Sentinel Node Biopsy** in Breast Cancer

The National Cancer Institute (NCI) is sponsoring two new studies to evaluate the long term effects of sentinel node biopsy in the treatment of breast cancer. The studies will compare the effects of removing only one or a few lymph nodes, the sentinel nodes, to the standard practice of removing a much larger number of underarm lymph nodes.

The sentinel nodes are the first lymph nodes to which breast cancer is likely to spread, and sentinel node biopsy is a technique to determine if cancer has spread beyond the breast. These two trials, conducted by the National Surgical Adjuvant Breast and Bowel Project (NSABP) and the American College of Surgeons Oncology Group (ACOS-OG), are the first to compare the long-term effects of sentinel node biopsy to conventional lymph node surgery.

PBCC President Appointed to PA Cancer Control Board



She serves as Co-Chair of the Board's "Income Tax Check Off" committee for Breast and Cervical Cancer Research.
